

the Israeli state to rely progressively for its rule on the mediation of the military government and its henchmen. This is contrasted to the situation in the Galilee where, after 1965, Jewish hegemony prevailed through the mechanism of civil society. Beneath the myriad of problems encountered by Israeli rule through the creation of dual regional, juridical, and ideological structures for the Palestinian and the settler populations, lies the framework of dependency on a commodity market and sources of cheap labour-power that have become functionally embedded into Israeli society. At the end of this chapter, we discuss the various political options open to Palestinians and Israelis within the confines of this integration.
